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# ANNUAL PLAN AND BUDGET APPROVED



The Devonport City Council's 2019/20 Budget – approved along with the Annual Plan at last night's Council meeting - includes an average general rate rise equating to little more than half of the Consumer Price Index for most ratepayers.

Over the past five years while the CPI has increased by 8.1% the city's general rate has only risen by 2.1%, which included four consecutive years of zero increases.

Most property owners will pay an extra \$10-\$20 in their general rate plus a \$10 increase in their waste management charge, the first increase in waste charges in two years. The majority of commercial customers, who receive three times the collection frequency of residential customers, will see an increase of \$30 in their waste management charge, but no increase in their general rate.

Council has had to factor into its Budget a 5.14% increase in the

State Fire Levy.

This is a State Government charge and one which Council is required to collect and forward directly to them.

The 2019/20 Capital Works program outlines a total spend of \$16.79 million, with almost \$4 million expected to come from external funding (see page two for more details).

The coming financial year promises to be an active time in Devonport with early work having begun on the privately funded \$40 million hotel development on the corner of Best and Rooke Streets, a continuation of the LIVING CITY masterplan strategy.

The Waterfront Park is a \$15 million construction project which will be two-thirds funded by a \$10 million Federal Government grant. The construction tender for the project is expected to be let in August.

# **COUNCIL APPROVES \$16.79 MILLION CAPITAL WORKS BUDGET**

The Council's 2019/20 Capital Works program outlines a total spend of \$16.79 million, with about \$4 million expected to come from external funding. This includes -

- \$1.32 million for public open space and recreation
- \$6.29 million for transport (roads and footpaths)
- \$1.29 million for stormwater and;
- \$6 million for the LIVING CITY waterfront development.

# **KELCEY TIER MASTER** PLAN APPROVED

Following extensive consultations with interest groups, Council last night approved the Kelcey Tier Master Plan.

Councillors were told that given the range of activities and its increasing popularity as a public space, it was important for Council to consider the needs of all parties while ensuring the environmental and natural values of the area were not compromised.

The Plan will contribute to the area being sustainably managed and in accordance with best practice.

This will enable the identified values for the reserve to be maintained and preserved while allowing it to be used for recreational purposes.

The Plan sets out recommendations relating to infrastructure requirements for the area.

However, as Council does not have funds committed in the 2019/20 financial year to undertake capital works any proposed works would either need to be factored into the forward capital works program or external funding sourced through other avenues.

Councillors were also told that an increase in the number and use of the trails would result in an increase in operational costs for Council to manage the risks in the area.
