Devonport is a sporting City. With thousands of dedicated athletes participating in a diverse range of clubs and sporting codes, our thriving and active sporting culture is testament to our unique and storied heritage. We don't just honour the past, but actively forge the future by nurturing the next generation of community leaders and champions.

In December 2021 the Devonport City Council adopted the Sports Infrastructure Master Plan 2035. A Working Group of local sporting clubs, peak organisations, Government and Council representatives developed the Plan with extensive consultation and research.

The Plan identifies over 30 projects to support the ongoing positive impacts of sporting clubs in our City and region. The Master Plan Working Group recommended that upon completion of the Plan, Council lead the implementation process with more specific precinct planning for key sites, prioritisation and refinement of recommended projects.

Working with sporting clubs, State sporting bodies and other partners to assess the recommendations in detail and identify and consider further opportunities, this Priority Investment Plan is the outcome of this extensive process.

Our clubs are united with Council in this shared vision as the blueprint for priority investment into sporting infrastructure within the City.


