All recycling must be placed in the recycling bin loose - not in plastic bags, boxes or tied up with string.



About the kerbside recycling assessment

The Cradle Coast Waste
Management Group (CCWMG)
will be conducting random bin
assessments to determine
how much general waste is
being incorrectly placed into
yellow lidded recycling bins in
northern Tasmania.

The assessment will be coupled with an education program to show residents what can and what cannot be placed in their recycling bins.

Each recycling bin will be checked a number of times to assess the level of contamination. Stickers will be placed on each bin depending on the amount of contamination found.




What CAN go into your kerbside recycling bin...



Paper and cardboard

Office paper, cardboard, letters and envelopes, junk mail, telephone books, pizza boxes (clean), ne





Aluminium, steel and tin-plated cans, aluminium foil (clean), paint tins (empty) and aerosol cans.

Glass

Bottles and jars (remove lids).



Hard plastic containers

Please empty and remove caps.

To recycle your plastic you need to know:

- Not all plastic packaging displays the recycling triangle (officially known as the Plastic Identification Code). This triangle tells you what plastic was used to make the packaging, not whether the packaging is recyclable.
- Plastic can be placed into two categories:

1. Hard Plastic

Any plastic that is rigid or holds its shape, for example shampoo bottles, can be recycled through your kerbside recycling bin.



2. Soft Plastic

Plastic that is flexible, for example, bread bags, bubble wrap and plastic bags, cannot be recycled in any Tasmanian kerbside recycling collection.

Most major supermarkets

now accept clean, flexible plastics for recycling.
Some transfer stations accept soft plastic.
